The Importance of Skill Based Learning

November is a time to reflect and plan. It is also report card time. To accurately understand the holistic needs of the children in our classrooms, it is important to report on the acquisition of skills since September and not focus solely on the curriculum. Projections through observing the isolation of quality, skills and the analysis of difficulty found within the Montessori materials allows us to predict the child's readiness for progression. Through an individualized skill based lesson plan, Montessori educators seek to engage our children through presentation of dynamic concepts with optimal timing, thus motivating them to explore the world. Children are presented with thought provoking material and problems for them to solve independently. Skill based learning allows children to ask questions, make predications, design experiments, collect and analyze their data, make conclusions and then share their new found insight with their peers. This confidence building process prompts further questions and inspires more research making skill based learning a community experience.

The Early Childhood and Elementary I & II Oral Exam Formats have been changed to Reflect the Importance of a Skill Based Approach

When developing her materials, Maria Montessori focused on the analysis of difficulty, isolating skills and concepts in order for the child to be successful. This year, the format of our oral exams has been changed so that TMI student teachers are required to demonstrate a solid understanding of the exercises and their purposes through the clarity of their movements during lesson presentation, the inherent points of interest and their ability to articulate clearly to the child. During the questions, TMI student teachers are asked to relate and connect the ideas introduced within curriculum areas focusing on the sequential development of skills and the scaffolding of concepts. They are asked to consider the integration of the curriculum areas and the way in which they indirectly/directly prepare for subsequent learning outcomes; e.g., connections between Practical Life activities and writing. Children are encouraged to take ownership of their learning with the support of educators who inspire and motivate the quest for knowledge through engaging lessons and relevant follow-up.

Practice Teaching Placements Support the Skill Based Learning of TMI Student Teachers

Through practice teaching, TMI student teachers gain a greater understanding of the scaffolding of skills and the value of the hands-on approach to learning that the Montessori philosophy offers. Early Childhood Full-Time student teachers look forward to practice teaching placements in TMS classrooms during afternoons in December. Our Infant Toddler and Part-Time Early Childhood student teachers are generally in classrooms throughout the year. TMI Elementary student teachers look forward to entering Lower Elementary classrooms throughout the GTA for the month of January. Through the experience of practice teaching, TMI students are able to engage in a skill based learning opportunity of their own. With your support and under your mentorship TMI student teachers begin to recognize the individual needs of the children and the pace at which they acquire skills. Thank you for welcoming TMI student teachers into your classrooms to teach and learn with your children. Please continue to support and encourage skill based learning at all levels!
